



WHAT IS THE SHSP?

- State's comprehensive five-year transportation safety plan
- Developed after consultation with a broad range of state and local safety stakeholders and partner
- Identifies a State's key safety needs and guides investment decisions towards strategies and countermeasure with the most potential to save lives and prevent injuries on all public roads
- Provides strategic direction for State, local, and tribal safety plans





THE SHSP ...

- Is a planning document that may provide opportunities for funding for programs or initiatives.
- Is the overarching plan and is to be coordinated with other State safety plans including the:
 - Highway Safety Improvement Program plan (HSIP),
 - Highway Safety Plan (HSP),
 - Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Plan (CMVSP),
 - Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), and
 - Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP).



SHSP VISION & MISSION STATEMENTS

VISION

Towards zero deaths and serious injuries so all surface transportation users arrive safely at their destination

MISSION

To improve the safety of all surface transportation users throughout Alaska through effective and equitable solutions using a Safe System Approach



THE SAFE SYSTEM APPROACH

- Incorporating the Safe System Approach can provide a more comprehensive perspective
- Other countries have seen a 47% (Australia) to 80% (Spain) reduction in fatalities since integrating the Safe System Approach.
- The approach is based on six principles and five elements.


