



## **Plan to Provide for the Deplanement of Passengers Following Excessive Tarmac Delays**

Aircraft serving Hoonah Airport typically do not need equipment for deplaning. The airport does not have an Airport Security Program under 49 CFR 1542, which allows passengers to deplane at the pilot's leisure. Tarmac delays of such aircraft are very uncommon. We will provide a list of hotels, taxi cabs, and eating establishments after receiving requests from such airlines experiencing excessive tarmac delays at the contact number listed above.

## **Plan to Provide for the Sharing of Facilities and Make Gates Available in an Emergency**

Due to the special circumstances at this Alaskan airport, the passenger terminal building at the Hoonah Airport is owned by the airlines on land that is under exclusive long-term lease to them and not controlled by the airport. The passenger facilities are privately operated, are typically only staffed during periods of commercial air activity. We will provide a list of tenants who operate extremely limited passenger facilities and may be able to provide assistance after receiving requests from airlines experiencing excessive tarmac delays at the contact number listed above. Hoonah airport is unable to accommodate aircraft weighing more than 12,500 lbs due to the limitations of the pavement strength, as published in the Alaska Supplement.

## **Plan to Provide a Sterile Area for Passengers Who Have Not Cleared United States Customs and Border Protection**

Hoonah Airport does not own or control any passenger facilities. In addition, there are no international passenger processing facilities and no local CBP officials. CBP officials would have to be flown approximately 45 miles to this airport in order to facilitate international passenger processing. We will coordinate with local CBP and law enforcement officials to identify suitable areas and procedures for establishing a temporary sterile area into which international passengers on diverted aircraft who have not yet cleared United States Customs and Border Protection can be deplaned. Once these efforts are complete, we will coordinate with local CBP officials to develop procedures that will allow international passengers who have not yet cleared United States Customs and Border Protection to be deplaned into these sterile areas to the extent practicable.
