

Figure 1-1, Alaska's Glenn Highway begins in downtown Anchorage at Milepost (MP) 0, where the All-American Seward Highway ends. The Glenn Highway then travels north and east to pass between the Chugach and the Talkeetna mountain ranges, and rises up to meet Alaska's vast Interior plateau.



## Introduction

The proposed Glenn Highway Scenic Byway has grown out of a local interest and enthusiasm for sharing the stories of the Byway, the land around it, and the indomitable spirit of the original inhabitants and the pioneers who helped settle America's Last Frontier–Alaska, the Great Land. The origin of this Byway nomination effort was a Palmer community meeting where a representative of the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (Alaska DOT&PF) was asked to speak about the Byways program within the state. The presentation that day was to be about a segment of the Parks Highway (another state scenic Byway) that was being proposed for nomination as a National Scenic Byway. A minute or two into the presentation, in typical Alaskan fashion, a member of the audience stood up and asked, over the voice of the presenter, why was he discussing the Parks Highway when, clearly, the Glenn Highway was far more scenic and historic in the development of Alaska. Unshaken by the interruption, the speaker continued his talk– replacing the Parks Highway with the Glenn Highway for the remainder of the presentation.

From that humorous beginning, the Glenn Highway National Scenic Byway nomination and Corridor Partnership Plan have had outstanding local support and continuing interest that has shaped this plan for improving, preserving, and developing the Glenn Scenic Byway. The communities of Anchorage, Eagle River, Chugiak, Palmer, Sutton, Chickaloon, King Mountain, Hicks Creek, Glacier View, and Sheep Mountain, along with the Matanuska-Susitna Borough, have proposed a Scenic Byway designation. Over a period of eight months, the partners have worked together and with the Alaska DOT on a "Partnership Board" to prepare the Glenn Highway Scenic Byway Partnership Plan.

The proposed Glenn Highway National Scenic Byway is approximately 135 miles long. It begins in Anchorage, Alaska at Milepost (MP) 0, and ends near the border of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough in the area of Gunsight Mountain. The first 3 miles of the Byway are urban in nature, beginning in the eastern part of downtown and extending through northeast Anchorage. While arguably less rustic than the rest of the corridor, this section provides an important connection to the end of the Seward Highway, Alaska's only All American Road. Starting the Glenn Byway at MP 0 will allow visitors and residents to travel on an All American Road regardless of the direction they choose to travel when departing from Anchorage.

To help the reader to grasp the phenomenal complexity and features of the Glenn Highway, the corridor is divided into four distinct segments for further discussion. This segmental approach can also help organize members of the Partnership Board into area and interest groups as they discuss what is most familiar to them. In the future, if regional subcommittees are needed, these divisions will provide a geographically based structure for development. Chapter 2 contains a listing of the segments and a brief description of each.
