
Freight Truck Distribution



The Alaska Trucking Association was founded in 1959 to serve the businesses that operate trucks in Alaska. ATA's members transport 85% of the shipments that travel on Alaska's highways each day. Our membership extends from Barrow to Ketchikan, ranges from the self employed owner-operators to the largest multi-modal transporters and everything in-between. The ATA represents over 200 companies and 17,000 Alaska employees.

Commerce

- Every day in Alaska trucks move more than 20,000 tons of Alaskan's supplies that range from Apples to X-Ray Machines.
- 94% of Alaska's population is directly dependent on trucking to supply their every day needs.
- In 2003 Alaska Trucks moved more than 12 million tons of freight.
- In Alaska the US Department of Transportation projects that annual freight movement will nearly double by 2020 to 21 million tons moved by truck.
- There are more than 98,000 commercial trucks that operate in Alaska they range in size from 18 wheelers to smaller delivery trucks.

Employment

- The trucking industry in Alaska is one of the largest private employers in the state employing more than 29,000 drivers and support employees.
- Alaska Truckers earned \$688 million in 2000 with an average salary of \$36,924
- Alaska is home to 5,535 for-hire and private trucking businesses.

User Fees

- Only 1 in 12 vehicles on Alaska's roadways is a truck, yet trucks pay 45% of all federal and state user fees.
- In 2001 an average operator of a typical five axel tractor-semi trailer paid \$6,920 in state and federal highway taxes \$1,344 will be paid directly to the state of Alaska.
- Alaska Trucks Operators collectively pay \$42 million in State and Federal Taxes.

Infrastructure

- Alaska has the 4th smallest National Highway System with only 2054 miles.
- Alaska Trucks put 281 Million Miles in during 2002, this represents only 6% of all the miles traveled in Alaska

Safety and Environment

- While Inspection of Tucks has increased by 385% from 1998-2003 the percentage of trucks put Out-of-Service is a mere 2%.
- In June 2006 Alaska Trucks will be burning the cleanest diesel ever produced. This fuel sulfur content will drop from 500ppm to 15ppm, to keep Alaska's environment pristine.

Technology

- Alaska's truckers are working with the Alaska Department of Transportation to utilize "Weight in Motion" technology to expedite commerce.
- Alaska trucking companies are now able to utilize GPS technology to provide better service to their customers.
- The Alaska trucking industry looks to advance the use of Intelligent Transportation Systems through Alaska DOT.
